

PEDESTRIAN CIRCULATION

Paved surfaces devoted to pedestrian walks are shown in solid red. Covered walks and porches are indicated in orange. There are a few unpaved, ad hoc paths, etched into the landscape to provide more direct or convenient routes for pedestrians; these are shown as linear red dots.

Conflict spots between pedestrians and automobiles are shown by a blue and white circle; the primary conflict spot is in front of the Lowry Center crossing Beall Avenue. Official crosswalks along Beall are indicated by a crosswalk striping on a yellow field. Paved areas shared by pedestrian and service vehicles are shown in red and white striping.

The purple circle superimposed on the map represents a five-minute walking distance from the center to the outer edge, based on a walking rate of three miles per hour. The circle is centered on the Gault/Andrews Library entrance, the symbolic center of academic activity. Distances between buildings that are within the circle can be walked in ten minutes or less, the typical scheduled break between classes. There are very few buildings outside the five-minute radius, and all of the academic core is within the circle. The map demonstrates this to be a very walkable, pedestrian campus. The path system connects most campus buildings; the most significant gap is from the northern housing sector to the north side of the PEC.

Entrances to buildings that accommodate those with physical disabilities are shown with the handicapped symbol. Other amenities include bicycle racks, that are shown with a yellow star inside a dark blue circle. Also indicated by a green three pointed symbol are security phones, which are distributed all across campus.
