







PREDOMINANT USE

The predominant use of buildings on the campus is shown on this drawing. The campus buildings are color-coded in thirteen distinct categories according to their use.

The campus has an interesting distribution of buildings and uses. Most academic buildings are in the southwest part of the campus; these are shown in red and anchor the central core. Scheide Music Center is the only academic building east of Beall Avenue, but it is still quite close to the other academic buildings. Also in this central area are the two libraries, Gault/Andrews Library and the Frick Art/Timken Science Libraries, which are shown in purple. The libraries are very centrally located and easily accessible from all sectors of the core campus. McGaw Chapel, and Westminster Church House accommodate religious and assembly functions and round out the central core area; they are shown in dark blue.

Student housing is distributed to the north, south, and east. Student residence halls are colored yellow and are located primarily in the northern sector of the campus. Student houses are shown in a peach color, and senior housing is shown in light orange; these are smaller scale residences located primarily in the southern sector of campus with a handful in the north. There are a few houses rented by the College to others; they are shown in pink and scattered in the southern housing sector. There is one building that is leased by the college, which houses some students; Henderson Apartments, shown in a pink and white stripe and located at the corner of Beall Avenue and Bloomington Avenue, is owned by the Presbyterian Church but leased to the College. It houses 6 students and several retired missionaries.

Administrative functions are scattered throughout the campus, indicated in blue. One of the primary administrative buildings is the iconic Galpin Hall, located on Bever Street; it is close to the campus core and houses Academic Affairs, Business Office, Dean's Offices, Finance and Business, President's Office, and the Development Offices. The Gault Admission Center is located at the southern end of the campus core. Culbertson House on E. Wayne Avenue houses Security & Protective Services.

Student life buildings are dark green. The Student Wellness Center is located to the west of Culbertson House. The Lowry Student Center on Beall Avenue houses a dining hall, snack bar, post office,

Scot Lanes, faculty lounge, and the Wilson Bookstore. While Kittredge Hall also has dining facilities, the Lowry Center is the primary place where student life activities occur.

Athletic and recreation facilities are brown, and most of these facilities are located to the east of Beall Avenue. Armington Physical Education Center (PEC) contains three gymnasiums and is the home facility for men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball and the College's swim teams. The new Scot Center is equipped with courts, running track, fitness center, batting cages, the athletic department offices and meeting rooms. To the south of the Scot Center is the John P. Papp Stadium, which is home to football, men's and women's lacrosse, track & field and field hockey. Other small athletic structures support the baseball and softball fields, the tennis courts, and the golf course.

Special use facilities are colored light green; these buildings include the Wooster Inn on the corner of Wayne Avenue and Gasche Street and the President's house located on University Street. Special use functions also occur in Freelander Theatre and in the Ebert Art Center, which houses The College of Wooster Art Museum. The Gault Family Learning Center is located on Beall Avenue; to the south of the campus the college does not own this property but supports community programs at the center. It is shown in a green striped pattern.

The Physical Plant support services are colored gray, and are situated in areas around the periphery of campus. The power plant is located at the corner of University Street and Gasche Street and the primary service buildings are located behind the Student Wellness Center on the north side of campus.

These buildings total 1.8 million gross square feet (GSF), of which 679,000 GSF are residential and 1.123 million GSF are non-residential.
